<u>Open Afternoon</u> – We had lots of prospective parents visit yesterday regarding admissions for next September 2020.

<u>Head Teacher's Availability</u> - Mr Heath will be available next week in Croscombe on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday then will be at Stoke St Michael on Monday and Wednesday. Mr Moore, our senior teacher will be available as usual.

<u>Harvest Festival</u> – Reverend Butler and Reverend Shellard-James led our harvest celebration this morning and it was themed around fruits of the spirit. Thank you to all who attended and to parents who kindly sent in harvest produce. I delivered the produce to The Salvation Army who will use for community lunches and also donated to the local food bank. One of our pupils Jacob W suggested we should collect food for the food bank



and not just at harvest time. We will set this up as a regular occurrence. We will put a box in the middle entrance for donations of dried and tinned goods for after half term.

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During the course of the day the children explored the history of their local area through four hands-on activities:

## The impact of the river and water, fulling and dyeing

The children experimented with different water wheel models. They were told about the fulling process and use of urine! (A paddling pool was filled with wool, Fullers Earth and coloured smelly cabbage water in which children could reproduce the process in bare feet.) They also got to dve small strips of fabric using non-toxic dves in a bucket.

## Stages of producing woollen cloth - dressing up and acting

Each child got to dress up and act out different roles in a story about a farmer wanting a special wool hat. The story illustrated the different stages and people involved in producing a wool item locally.

Weaving

basic explanation of weaving Α

including warp and weft. The difference between weaving looms used circa 1600 and handheld looms. Children were able to try weaving on a small handheld loom.

## The working lives of Croscombe children

Children explored working conditions, punishments and gruesome

accidents of children. They heard Thomas Pratt's boyhood account of working at Lower Silk Mill (now the sewage works) where Croscombe children were employed, and of the great fire there in 1843.


# Mr Moore/Mrs Hooper/Mrs Bloom

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Sebastian (diversity persona doll) - Have you heard about Sebastian? He is 5 years old and

was born in Taunton. His great granddad was raised in Kingston, Jamaica. In 1948, he arrived in Britain aboard a ship called the MV Empire Windrush. He was amongst many people from Jamaica who would help rebuild the country after World War II (1939 – 1945). He got a job working for London Transport on the Underground

Sebastian's Grandad lives in London and manages a restaurant serving traditional Caribbean food, including Sebastian's favourite ackee (a fruit related to lychee) and saltfish.

Sebastian's Dad has a job working for the BBC and was transferred to the Bristol studios where he is a director of the local news programs. On a visit to Wells, he found an old thatched cottage that he fell in love with it and decided to move there.

The children have been helping Sebastian attend the school assemblies where he particularly likes the celebration assembly every Friday, when parents are welcome to join us.
